Pastor's Message

Where do we go from here? Knowing the next steps that we have to take in any journey can be difficult. As a parent, I have long discussions with my wife about how our kids are growing and learning, what we should do in the future about schooling, how we can cultivate their interests; the list goes on. It seems like there are never ending choices to be made. In those cases, it can feel overwhelming to have some many different choices in front of you. Other times, it can feel like the opposite situation is at hand. You feel stuck and there seems to be no way out. Maybe you can relate. Perhaps you have been faced with decisions also, have felt like your job is at a dead end, or are caring for a family member who has worn you into exhaustion. Or perhaps, it's just your golf game that seems to have plateaued. Regardless, I think we have all felt like we had too many choices, or too few, at times and been unsure of where to go. Have you ever felt that way about your faith journey? Sometimes our relationship with Jesus doesn't seem like it has progressed like you thought it would; maybe things haven't been the same for so long, you have stopped expecting anything to change at all.

God lays out two primary steps in the gospels for His people, a pattern for living in faith. First, He calls us to Him and then He sends us out. Jesus says "Come to me, all of you who are weary and carry heavy burdens, and I will give you rest" in Matthew 11:28 and then later in Matthew 28:19 says "Go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit". We all must come to Him, and we all must go out. That process of making disciples of all nations is core to what it means to be a Christian. It isn't something we can outsource to other people. It is something that we need to do ourselves in order to grow in faith. Reaching others is part of our own journey. When we teach, we learn. The act of explaining something to others and including them in the understanding helps your understanding to grow as well. This has been called The Protégé Effect by some educators and it's been part of the Christian journey since the very beginning. It is by reaching out and including others, instructing and mentoring them in their faith that our own faith grows. This process is called discipleship and no instruction manual or lecture will ever teach you as much as discipleship will. No other method will grow the church and your own faith like true discipleship.

This process of discipleship is what our Next Steps bible study will focus on starting on October 6th at 8am and running for 6 weeks. It doesn't matter where you are in your faith journey you are welcome. We will be starting from the basics of what it means to follow Christ, examining what our doubts and questions about Jesus are, and exploring what it means to be part of a church. If you have been coming to bible studies all your life, come and bring a friend. If you haven't been to one in years, come. If this will be the first time you have ever considered learning more about Christianity, come, talk story and bring a friend!

How Your Neighbors in Need Offering Helps: Dyslexia tutoring a matter of justice for Wisconsin kids

Dyslexia doesn't just make it hard to read. Sometimes it makes a kid feel left out.

In Northeast Wisconsin, kids and their parents can turn to a church for dyslexia support. Thanks in part to a Neighbors in Need grant from the United Church of Christ, Union Congregational UCC in Green Bay regularly welcomes dozens of kids for one-on-one tutoring at its On the Mark Dyslexia Clinic.

Wisconsin is one of only two U.S. states that does not require dyslexia instruction in public schools, so demand is high. "When I applied for the NIN funds, I was anticipating possibly 40 students for the 2019 summer program," said Executive Director Patricia Shafer. Fifty-four have been coming to appointments, Monday through Thursday, 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. After a \$25 registration free, the tutoring is free. Last school year, with hours from 1 to 7 p.m., the clinic was already serving 28 students regularly from grades K through 12. They traveled as far as 40 miles to the downtown clinic.

The clinic started in June 2018 with a grant of \$8,000 from the congregation's Gifts and Memorials Fund. It costs about \$1,000 a month to run the clinic, Shafer said, including curriculum costs, tutor stipends (\$12 per hour), insurance and phone expenses. The church charges no rent. Shafer volunteers her time, as do half of the program's 16 summer tutors. Training can be expensive; a recent session for several new tutors was \$7,500. This year's \$3,000 NIN grant helped pay for summer tutors and Wilson Reading System instructional materials.

The weather has gotten colder and students are back in school: It's finally Fall, which means our toddler playgroup is back in session.

Veronica leads the children and their families in fun activities every Wednesday on the church grounds. 
